The Upside Down Kingdom How Spiritual Poverty Leads to Reign

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven."

- Matthew 5:3 (NIV)

In the upside-down Kingdom of God, the path to reign begins with surrender. Jesus' words in Matthew 5:3 seem backwards to the world, but in His Kingdom, blessing doesn't come from wealth, strength, or success. It begins with emptiness.

To be poor in spirit is to recognize our spiritual poverty before a holy God.

We have nothing to offer Him, nothing that could earn salvation.

We come as beggars, needy, helpless and dependent. And yet, in that posture of total dependence, Jesus promises the highest reward: "the kingdom of heaven."

The Kingdom of heaven brings a total reversal of our value systems and our idea of who we consider "the fortunate ones".

But what exactly is the Kingdom of Heaven?

The Kingdom of Heaven is the rule and reign of God over His people and His creation.

It was inaugurated with the coming of Jesus, the Messiah, and is now present wherever He is Lord. All who have received Christ as Savior are citizens of this Kingdom, living under His authority. Yet the Kingdom is also not yet, it awaits its full and final fulfillment at Jesus' second coming, when He will restore all things and reign in glory.

The Kingdom of Heaven is both our present reality and our future hope.

The Kingdom of heaven brings a total reversal of our value systems and our idea of who we consider "the fortunate ones". The way into this Kingdom isn't through merit, status, or striving.

"With man this is impossible, but not with God; all things are possible with God."

- Mark 10:27

It is impossible to save ourselves. Salvation is entirely the work of God, received by grace through faith. Our response is to count the cost, surrender our will, and walk in humble obedience.

Not that we are adequate in ourselves so as to consider anything as having come from ourselves, but our adequacy is from God


